- prevent environmental degradation and pollution through regular plantation programs
- maintain green, clean, healthy campus with organic kitchen garden, medicinal plant garden
- foster eco-friendly, sustainable practices (waste management, composting, endorsing circular economy)
- promote environmentally-friendly sustainable livelihood through handhold training

The Context:

Raidighi College is situated within the Sundarban region, a UNESCO World Heritage site, renowned for its unparalleled biodiversity. However, it faces mounting threats from the devastating impacts of climate change, heightening its vulnerability. In recent years, various major cyclones have resulted in gradual depletion of mangrove and other biological resources, soil erosion, salt water intrusion and disruption of natural habitats. Simultaneously, the local livelihoods have been brutally impacted. Financial inequality, unplanned disproportionate modernization, unsustainable livelihood practices and deficit of ecological cognizance and compassion threaten severe broad-scale environmental degradation.







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Recognizing the pressing ecological challenges, our college underscores the urgent need for action and puts in best efforts in building a greener tomorrow through curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Initiatives are aided by~

- vii. College lacks sufficient manpower needed for sustainable green practices.

Constrains:

Transforming the mindset of girls who have been marginalized for generations is a challenging task.

Evidence of Success:







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Girl empowerment has emerged as an effective force dismantling older oppressive norms. Our efforts are being gradually rewarded as we replace the old narrative of deprivation and marginalization with accounts of success, self-fulfillment and an overall positive sense of purpose in life. This is evident from:

- 1) Increase in girl student enrollment in college, decrease in drop-outs
- 2) Increase in pass percentage of girl students, along with progression to higher studies (PG).
- 3) Improvement in nutritional and health practices of girls with the message spreading to their families.
- 4) Several awards/acknowledgements received by our girl students (from Raidighi College, University of Calcutta, Microbiologists Society of India, Government offices, other institutes/organizations), in studies, sports, cultural events, outreach activities, competitions.
- 5) Our college has been awarded by state government for Kanyashree scholarship initiative.
- 6) Successful COVID-19 vaccination drive, Thalassemia screening camp conducted for all girl students.
- 7) Noiceable changes in prevailing mindset of silence, compliance, subservience among rural girls
- 8) Girls taking up responsibility of spreading social messages and breaking down societal shackles by becoming NSS volunteers.
- 9) Girls feeling free to express their thoughts and perspectives through oral presentations, posters, slogans
- 10) Enthusiastic participation by boys and girls alike, in gender-based seminars, workshops, awareness programs

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- 1) Society is still rife with gender inequalities and an underlying patriarchal mindset, especially in rural regions.
- 2) Persuading families to allow their daughters to complete their UG course and pursue further higher studies is a challenging task.
- 3) Deep-rooted cultural norms, discriminatory traditions, and poverty issues pose significant obstacles.
- 4) Lack of fund, resources and adequate staff, does not allow us to organize community awareness campaigns on larger scale.
- 5) Educated mothers are more likely to prioritize their daughters' education, thereby initiating a cycle of progress and empowerment. But fund deficit and insufficient manpower prevent us from initiating a long-planned adult literacy project for older females.
- 6) Lack of financial support also rules out the prospect of establishing an aid fund dedicated to supporting promising but economically disadvantaged girl students. This could have helped us significantly reduce drop-out rates.

SERVICE AGREEMENT FOR E-WASTE MANAGEMENT

The Agreement is entered into at Kolkata on this 14 day of September, 2022.

By and Between

<u>Hulladek Recycling Private Limited</u>, a company incorporated under the Companies Act 2013 having its registered office at <u>4</u>, <u>D.L. Khan Road</u>, <u>Flat No. B-401</u>, <u>4th Floor</u>, <u>Kolkata-700025</u>, <u>West Bengal</u>, <u>India</u> thereinafter referred to as First Party which expression shall unless contrary to and or repugnant to the context mean and include its successors representative and permitted assigns through <u>Mr. Nandan Mall</u> to enter into and sign this <u>Agreement for and on behalf of the First Party</u>.

AND

Raidighi College established in 1995, is an undergraduate college in Raidighi, West Bengal. It is affiliated with the University of Calcutta having its premises at P.O.+P.S. Sub. Division: Diamond Harbour,24 Paraganas(South) Raidighi, West Bengal 743383. There in after referred to as Second Party which expression shall underscontrary to and or repugnant to the context mean and include its successors representative and permitted assigns through Dr.Sasabindu Jana (Principal) to enter into and sign this Agreement for and on behalf of the Second Party.

- A.) First Party is a registered Producer Responsibility Organization (PRO) vide The Registration No. B-29016(12)/ (PRO)/18/WM-III Division dated 12.11.2018 valid up to 12.11.2023 and is authorized to undertake activities prescribed for Producer Responsibility Organizations.
- B.) The Second Party in compliance of E-Waste Management Rules, 2018 & 2022 desires to have services for management of their Electronic Waste except liquid waste.







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Now, being that, this Agreement witnesses the following terms & conditions to be performed by both the parties to the Agreement.

- The First Party has agreed to pick up, transport, carry and recycle/dispose of the E-Waste from the second party as per the norms prescribed by the Government Authorities from time to time.
- The First Party has agreed to make available Utilization Certificate confirming that E-Waste provided by the Second party to the First Party has been recycled/ disposed of as per the norms prescribed by the Government Authorities within 60 days of the pick up the E-Waste.
 - The second party will sign required documents to acknowledge that E-Waste has been handed over to the First Party.
- This agreement will be in force for a period of <u>Five (05) years (14.09.2022 13.09.2027)</u> from the date of execution of this Agreement and can be renewed at the end of every period by mutual consent.
- The second party is expected to generate minimum 300 kgs of E-Waste annually during each contractual term.
- 5. The First Party shall provide compliance documents such as Form 2', 'Form 3' Query Letters from PCB or any other document required as per government norms and shall file annual return for the respective year to the state pollution control board on a chargeable basis of per location, annually as records of e-waste movement from the premises of the second party to first party as and when applicable
- The Second Party will accumulate all E-Waste and inform to the first party once reasonable volume (approx. 200 kgs minimum) has accumulated. The pickups confirmed by the Second Party will be carried out on a priority basis within Five days from the date of request.
- The Second party has agreed to handover the E-Waste items, the details of which are
 mentioned here below to the first party on "as is where is basis". The first party will
 dispose off such equipment and specifically agreed that they will charge the second party.
- The Second party has agreed to handover the E-Waste, the details of which are mentioned here below to the first party on "as is where is basis".
 - The first party will dispose off such equipment and specifically agreed that they
 will charge the second party towards the disposal of E-Waste as shown in
 ANNEXURE 2.
 - The first party will pay in case of the items in ANNEXURE 1. Any monies payable/receivable by the First party will be identified and settled by 7th of preceding month for the current month or the subsequent month/s as may be mutually decided from time to time. Applicable GST on such items will be additional.
- 10. The second party's responsibility will cease once electronic waste has been handed over to the First Party s per clause 3 above. Thereafter, no liability would accrue to the Second party on account of e-waste.
- 11. The renewal of the contract is chargeable at the end of the tenure/period and the documentation formalities shall be done by the First Party within 30-45 days prior to the date of agreement termination.

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Records & data of the e-waste material procured will be maintained and transparently shared by the first party.

- 13. The Second Party has agreed that the general waste such as municipal solid Waste will not be included in the E-Waste.
- 14. It is clearly agreed that all the E-waste procured by or in the possession of the second party will be exclusively managed by the first party as per the terms and conditions specified above
- 15. The First Party shall conduct an '<u>Awareness Session'</u> at the premises of the 'Second Party' for generating awareness about the benefits and process of e-waste recycling.
 - a. The second party then shall prepare and share with first party an Awareness report to be submitted the West Bengal pollution control board.
- 16. Refund and Termination: During the tenure In case The First Party Fails to Deliver any of the services mentioned or any operational service failure Then It shall be a liable cause for Termination of the Agreement by the Second Party post which the balance advance amount for the year of 2022-2027 shall be refunded by the First Party to the Second Party without any interest.

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A FEW ENVIRONMENTAL REPORTS

Green Report

LESS TOXICITY MORE SUSTAINABILITY it is the prime objective of Raidighi College green club. Every step or change in our observation activity reflected our long-term sustainable beneficiary views. We have collaborative practice under several departments and stronghold on potential professionals for improvement our achievements and destination towards the sustainability.

In Shorts our work plan----

Section A

Hazard free campus:

Plastic And other non-degradable wastes are collected in a particular restricted sterile zone and dispatched regularly through a Memorandum of understanding with a recognized NGO named Human Wave.

Every wet waste and organic debris are deposited in compost preparation pit with well-maintained facility like biodegrade culture, structural satisfaction of pit, regular aeration & and watering etc.

No burning of weeds or other waste is not allowed in campus, only ideal for bacterial media in compost pit.

Weeds remover or herbicide chemicals are strictly prohibited here. Due to dangerous toxicity of herbicides, this type of chemicals long durable and main agent of ecological disaster of our natural biodiversity. There is so many research paper highlighted in our regular discussion among different stakeholders. We are believer of "not to destroy our natural herbs and grasses by using chemical spray on road side or agricultural fields".

Section B

Energy conservation:

In this head line a large achievement reached, roof top solar panel installation completed. Now we are a clean electricity generator and transmission unit of our power grid.

Suitable electricity consumption unit's modification and modulation are ongoing regular basis with permeable funding allocation. Quarterly consumption rate analysis and effective modification maintained regularly by responsible subcommittee with valuable discussion among us.

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Section C

Rain water Harvesting:

Proper ground water recharge through rainwater harvesting is not appropriate project in our location. But salinity reduction through rain water utilization is better for us. We are located in a saline river bank and more or less saline water submerged condition appears in every 5 to 10 years. So, our main objective restoration of soil properties by removing salinity through rain water washing. A 5000-litter water tank used as reservoir of rain water and different way out for toilet washing, drainage cleaning, supply additional sweet water to the pond for less salinity etc.

Section D:

Plantation:

Huge potential sector, there are so many steps taken time to time, in shorts....

Fruit Plants propagation.... Every seminar, Meeting or discussion with recourses person, guest and other important personals are welcomed by a token of gift of Fruit plants from our end.

Plantation and adoption of fruit plant in our campus achieved great tempo as a great ceremony.

Environmental studies programme has regular project outcome as protection of biodiversity and plantation of consumable perennial fruit plants in local area. On the basis of Last discussion, 1000 deshi Khejur Plantation per session programme approved by our administration to prevent indigenous food product adulteration in sundarban area. It may be helpful for pure Jiggery (Khejur gur, pataly) availability due to huge resources generate programme.

Herbs and important medicinal weeds are tagged in our campus for better settlement of this kind of highly valuable, multirole, medicinal and essential cattle fodder for disease resistance and milk quality improvement, ethno botanical importance and accessibility, etc.

Section E:

Sustainable Development with Plant science (SDWP):

In continuation of Sustainable Development with Plant Science, Phase III, Green club prepared a work plan collaboration With NSS unit, Botany Department and some Non-government Organization of our locals. Mangrove study and focus on its ecological importance, green compost, organic farming, energy plantation, motivational workshop, practical and economic workshop, awareness programme, etc included in session 2022-23.

Section F:

Compost Preparation Pilot Project:

It's a very potential upcoming sustainable economic backbone restructuring sector of Indian agricultural sector. Economic pressure of import duty of synthetic fertilizer causes the rise of exponential expenditure in agriculture. Another important factor is bioaccumulation of toxicity

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in everywhere. After long interval we finally start minimum cost compost preparation and demonstration of bio compost in our campus. Every step and regulation of pit always open to our student for practical approach.

Section G:

Medicinal Plant Garden:

Pre-established, well designed and more than 100 species of medicinal plants are growing in our campus. Regular monitoring and demonstration of utility does occur. According to B.Sc. Botany syllabus, one section of this garden arranged in Bentham Hooker classification for spot identification. Another section maintained for horticultural and beautification in front of garden. A Woman health related section is ongoing for ethno medicinal knowledge improvement special reference to our girl's student's heath benefit. All-important plants are identified and tagged with their formulation reference.

Section H:

Pisciculture unit:

We have about 40 decimal semi saline sweet water pond in our campus. Different mix culture fish are grown under natural farming procedure jointly by the college and responsible fisherman of locals. Department of Zoology are operating regularly with our students and its purely educational purpose.

We hope Professional touches of expatriation and Green Audit always move us to reach goal of sustainability to our futuristic achievements.

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Online students' awareness quiz on the occasion of World Water Day 22/3/23



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


World Science Day for Peace and Development 10th November, 2021



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
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A DETAILED REPORT ON THE MEDICINAL PLANT GARDEN

As per Raidighi College Green Club Resolution dated 19th September 2019, our medicinal plant garden ,The Dr. Kalipada Biswas Medicinal Plant Garden, formerly known as the Raidighi College Medicinal Plant Garden, has expanded to include various poly-herbal formulations. These formulations are not only for identification purposes but also allow stakeholders to collect leaves and twigs for medicinal use. Below are details on some (26 species are allowed to public collection) important medicinal plants and their combinations

1. Ashwagandha (Withania somnifera) (Solanaceae)

Uses: Reduces stress, boosts energy levels, and improves concentration.

Parts Used: Roots, Leaves

Details: This adaptogenic herb is often used to enhance physical and mental performance. It helps the body adapt to stress and has rejuvenating properties.







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2. Hadjoda (Cissus quadrangularis)

Parts Used: Stem










26. Potari (Abutilon indicum)

 Warm up Euphorbia tithymaloides stem juices until they transform into a milky white color and become a watery liquid.

2. Application:

- o Wrap up the wound with cotton soaked in the prepared Euphorbia stem juice.
- o Cover the wound with Calotropis leaves.
- o Allow the bandage to stay overnight.

Benefits:

- This combination is beneficial for ligament wounds.
- The Euphorbia stem juice is known for its wound-healing properties, and when combined with the soothing and anti-inflammatory attributes of Calotropis leaves, it can promote faster healing and alleviate discomfort associated with ligament injuries.

Vernonia, Boerhavia, Mikania, wedelia collected from this garden by the patient's relative time to time and he recover from dangerous injury. The Sundarbans mangrove forest, located in the delta region of the Ganges, Brahmaputra, and Meghna rivers in Bangladesh and India, is one of the largest contiguous mangrove ecosystems in the world. Here are some key characteristics of mangroves in the Sundarbans:

- 1. **Biodiversity**: The Sundarbans mangroves support a rich diversity of flora and fauna, including numerous species of mangrove trees, wildlife such as Bengal tigers, crocodiles, spotted deer, and a variety of birds, fish, and invertebrates.
- 2. **Adaptations to Salinity**: Sundarbans mangroves are adapted to high salinity levels. They have specialized mechanisms to exclude salt from their tissues, such as salt glands in their leaves or the ability to excrete excess salt through their roots.
- 3. **Tidal Influence**: Tides play a significant role in shaping the Sundarbans mangrove ecosystem. The area experiences diurnal tides, with water levels rising and falling twice a day. Mangroves in the Sundarbans are adapted to regular tidal inundation and often have prop roots or pneumatophores to cope with fluctuating water levels.
- 4. **Mangrove Species**: The Sundarbans mangrove forest is home to several species of mangrove trees, including Sundri (Heritiera fomes), Gewa (Excoecaria agallocha), Goran (Ceriops decandra), Keora (Sonneratia apetala), and Kankra (Bruguiera gymnorhiza), among others.
- 5. **Ecosystem Services**: Sundarbans mangroves provide valuable ecosystem services, including shoreline stabilization, protection against coastal erosion, carbon sequestration, and habitat for numerous species of wildlife. They also support local communities by providing resources such as timber, fish, and honey.
- 6. **Threats and Conservation**: The Sundarbans mangrove ecosystem faces various threats, including habitat loss due to deforestation, pollution from industrial activities and shipping, climate change impacts such as sea-level rise and cyclones, and human-wildlife conflict. Conservation efforts are underway to protect and sustainably manage this unique and ecologically important ecosystem.

Mangrove species have evolved to thrive in specific environmental conditions, including variations in salinity, water depth, and soil type. In areas like the Sundarbans, which experience dynamic changes in these factors, the natural selection of mangrove seeds for plantation is crucial for successful vegetation development.







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When planning artificial or natural mangrove plantation projects along river banks or in other coastal areas, it's essential to consider the following factors:

- 1. **Salinity Tolerance**: Different mangrove species have varying levels of tolerance to salinity. Selecting species that are adapted to the salinity levels of the specific river bed is important for their survival and growth.
- 2. **Water Depth**: Some mangrove species are better adapted to shallow water conditions, while others can thrive in deeper areas. Understanding the water depth variations along the river bank helps in choosing appropriate species for plantation.
- 3. **Soil Type**: Mangroves grow in diverse soil types, ranging from sandy to muddy substrates. Certain species may prefer one type of soil over another, so selecting species that are suited to the soil conditions of the river bed is essential.
- 4. **Tidal Influence**: Mangroves are influenced by tidal patterns, with some species preferring areas with regular tidal inundation while others thrive in areas with less frequent inundation. Planting species that match the tidal regime of the river bank enhances their chances of establishment and growth.
- 5. **Ecological Role**: Consider the ecological functions of different mangrove species, such as their role in shoreline stabilization, biodiversity support, and habitat provision for wildlife. Selecting a mix of species that fulfil various ecological roles can enhance the resilience and sustainability of the planted mangrove forest.

By carefully considering these factors and allowing for natural selection processes to occur, mangrove plantation efforts can contribute to the restoration and conservation of coastal ecosystems while promoting the long-term health and biodiversity of the area.

• Sundri (*Heritiera fomes*): Known locally as "Sundari", it's one of the dominant species in the Sundarbans and provides valuable timber.








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• Gewa (*Excoecaria agallocha*): Known locally as "Gewa", it's a common species found in the Sundarbans.

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• Hantal (*Phoenix paludosa*): Known locally as "Hantal", it's a species of palm found in the Sundarbans.









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• Kankra (*Bruguiera gymnorhiza*): Known locally as "Kankra", it's characterized by its stilt roots and is often found in the intertidal zone.









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• Passur (*Xylocarpus mekongensis*): Known locally as "Passur", it's a mangrove species with climbing habits.









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• Dundhul (Xylocarpus granatum) Cannon ball tree.









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• Kankrol (*Rhizophora mucronata*): Known locally as "Kankrol", it's a type of mangrove with proproots that help it to withstand tidal forces.









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 Avicennia officinalis is one of the mangrove species found in coastal regions of the Indian subcontinent, including areas like the Sundarbans. It typically grows in intertidal zones and is characterized by its pencil pneumatophores (aerial roots) and salt-excreting glands on its leaves, which allow it to thrive in saline environments

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A REPORT FROM

Raidighi College Department of Botany

Sustainable Development with Plant Science (SDWPS).

Since 2014, Raidighi College's Department of Botany has been running a project titled "Sustainable Development with Plant Science" (SDWPS). The primary focus of this project is the integration of plant science with sustainability principles, ensuring that development meets the evolving demands of nature and the environment. Regular observations and continuous improvements have been made to the college campus throughout the project's duration.

The project is structured into multiple phases, from 2014 to the present, with each phase marking significant milestones and developments.

Phase I (2014):

The journey began with the establishment of a 5,000 square feet medicinal plant garden on the college campus. This phase was initiated with a monetary contribution of 5,000 INR, in collaboration with the Raidighi College NSS Unit. The project was spearheaded by the former principal, Prof. Ali Reza Molla, a true nature lover and a man of wisdom and vision. Under his guidance, a garden featuring 50 species of plants was established within a year, focusing primarily on syllabus-oriented plants and local vegetation.

Student Benefits:

In Phase I, the Department of Botany developed to become independent for local excursions and spot identification during practical examinations. This development has greatly benefited students in several ways:

- **Plant Taxonomy:** Students received high appreciation for their enhanced skills in plant taxonomy, allowing them to identify and classify various plant species accurately.
- Medicinal Plant Identification & Morphology: The establishment of the medicinal plant garden
 provided a hands-on learning environment where students could identify and study the morphology
 of medicinal plants.
- **Plant Anatomy:** The garden served as a practical resource for students to observe and understand plant anatomy in a real-world context.

As a result of this installation, the Department of Botany now offers a complete, student-friendly structure and better facilities compared to many larger and more prestigious colleges in urban areas. This has made Raidighi College's Department of Botany a preferred choice for students interested in plant science and sustainable development.









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Phase II (2016-2017):

Under the SDWPS initiative, the first priority was given to plantation within the college campus to mitigate the extra heat generated by bare building reflections during summer. A green meeting resolution supporting this agenda was accepted by the committee, and a request for plantation support was forwarded to the Raidighi Grampanchayet.

September 2016:

It was decided to trim some branches of the Eucalyptus trees planted by the Raidighi Grampanchayet as part of our proposal. This action successfully reduced the temperature of the entire college campus. For example, a single sunflower plant can transpire 75 gallons of water to the environment throughout its lifecycle, acting as a natural temperature regulator. This phase focused on planting such natural regulators without any cost or hazard.

September 2017:

After a year of dedicated efforts, a concrete pathway adorned with more than 400 flowering plants, such as Dopati, Vinka, and Ganda, was established. During the previous winter, the pathway was exceptionally attractive with large sunflower blooms. It became a common sight to see parrots flying down to the sunflower heads near sunset to feed on the seeds. Additionally, the project yielded approximately 8 kg of sunflower oil from the remaining seeds.

Benefits:

- **Beautification:** The college campus became more visually appealing.
- **Increased Moisture:** Enhanced the moisture levels in the environment.
- **Ecological Impact:** Supported local wildlife and improved the ecological balance.
- Campus Freshness: Contributed to a fresher and more pleasant campus atmosphere.

Our respected Principal was directly involved in this project every step of the way, ensuring its success and sustainability.

Phase III (2018-2019):

The extension of the medicinal plant garden continued with the addition of more than 100 species. A separate location was allotted for a single vegetation bed display, allowing both our students and those from other colleges to conduct identification work within this allocation. The conserved natural and undisturbed region of the medicinal plant garden is maintained exclusively by specialists.

Next Steps:

We are excited to introduce some orchids with diverse spectrums to enhance the garden's biodiversity. Additionally, a mangrove photo gallery, highlighting the indigenous species along the banks of the Moni River and focusing on crab protection awareness, is planned to be established next to the medicinal plant garden.









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September 2016:

A PowerPoint presentation was prepared by the Department of Botany to convey the message of crab protection effectively. Within a year, two articles were published addressing the main challenge of protecting the Sundarbans from threats to its crab population. One of the articles, titled "Sundarbaner Pran, Sundarbaner Kada," offered a diversified perspective on sustainable development in the Sundarbans.

Impact:

The interest in mangroves among students has grown significantly. In response, we propose the establishment of a mangrove study centre, monitored jointly by the Department of Botany and the Department of Zoology.

Benefits:

- **Educational Resource:** The extended medicinal plant garden and the new mangrove photo gallery provide invaluable educational resources for students and researchers.
- Conservation Awareness: Increased awareness of crab protection and mangrove conservation among students and the local community.
- **Biodiversity:** The addition of diverse plant species, including orchids, enhances the biodiversity of the garden.
- Collaborative Learning: The project fosters collaboration between different departments and institutions, enriching the learning experience.

Phase IV (2019-2022):

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the focus shifted towards cultivating immuno-boosting herbs and creating polyherbal formulations to support community health.

Post-Amphan Cyclone (2020):

After the Amphan cyclone, invasive and toxic phytochemical-releasing timber-yielding plants were destroyed and removed. In their place, various fruit plants were introduced to the garden. These fruit plants were propagated and given as gifts at college ceremonies, seminars, and other events, fostering a sense of community and sustainability.

Mangrove Photo Gallery:

A mangrove photo gallery was established, featuring 30 species found near the Moni River bank, promoting awareness of these vital ecosystems and their conservation.

September 2021:

A PowerPoint presentation prepared by the Department of Botany emphasized the importance of crab protection for mangrove re forestation near Saline river bank.









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Sustainable Kitchen Garden:

A sustainable kitchen garden program was started adjacent to the office building as an experimental phase, aiming to provide fresh produce and serve as a model for sustainable living practices.

Principal's Involvement:

Our respected Principal, Dr. Sasabindu Jana, remained actively involved in every phase of the project, ensuring its ongoing success and alignment with the college's mission and values.

Phase V (2022-2023):

The devastation caused by Cyclones Amphan and Yash left a profound impact on the medicinal plant garden at Raidighi College. The precious reservation, brimming with botanical treasures, succumbed to the fury of nature. However, from the ashes of destruction emerged a beacon of resilience and innovation.

Rebirth of the Medicinal Plant Garden: Through a pioneering initiative, the medicinal garden at Raidighi College was reborn, fortified against the difficulties of saline water invasion. An ingenious plan was devised, featuring the installation of cement structure rings to shield the flora from future calamities. Fifty such rings were acquired, each meticulously placed to safeguard the first fifty species.

These cement rings, standing as bastions against inundation, symbolize not just protection but also hope for the revival of biodiversity. Within the demarcated perimeters of each ring, a singular species of vegetation flourishes, signifying nature's persistence amidst adversity. With an elevation of eight inches above ground level, these botanical havens stand tall, resilient against the tides of destruction.

The reestablishment of Raidighi College's medicinal garden through this innovative approach showcases the power of human creativity in harmony with nature. It stands as a testament to our commitment to preserving biodiversity and nurturing life, even in the face of the most formidable challenges.

Combating Invasive Species: Indeed, the invasive plants, particularly Acacia moniliformis, presented a formidable challenge to the delicate ecosystem of Raidighi College's medicinal garden. Despite their resilience, these invaders posed a multifaceted threat. Their unchecked proliferation led to the overshadowing of indigenous species, disrupting the balance and vitality essential for the garden's health and sustainability.

The dominance of Acacia moniliformis not only altered the composition of the ecosystem but also introduced adverse ecological dynamics. The phytochemicals leached by these invasive plants inhibited the germination and growth of medicinal species, compounding the garden's plight. As a result, the once-rich biodiversity of the garden faced significant jeopardy, with native medicinal plants struggling to thrive amidst the encroachment of invasive species.









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This ecological imbalance underscored the urgent need for intervention and restoration efforts. Recognizing the detrimental impact of invasive plants on the medicinal garden's ecological integrity, proactive measures were implemented to mitigate their spread. Through strategic removal initiatives and targeted management strategies, the invasive species were gradually supplanted, allowing native flora to reclaim their rightful place within the ecosystem.

The plight of Raidighi College's medicinal garden serves as a poignant reminder of the insidious threat posed by invasive species to natural ecosystems. Yet, through diligent conservation efforts and a commitment to restoring ecological equilibrium, the garden stands as a testament to the resilience of nature and the transformative power of proactive conservation measures.

Visionary Program for Fruit Plant Propagation: A visionary program has been initiated to transform the landscape of roadsides and institutional campuses by prioritizing the propagation and plantation of common fruit plants over timber-yielding species. This strategic shift reflects a commitment to sustainability, community well-being, and environmental stewardship.

The adoption of common fruit plants serves multiple purposes, aligning with both ecological and socio-economic objectives. By introducing a diverse array of fruit-bearing species, the program not only enhances the aesthetic appeal of the surroundings but also promotes biodiversity and ecosystem resilience. Moreover, the availability of fresh fruits contributes to improved nutrition and food security, particularly in areas where access to nutritious foods may be limited.

Furthermore, the propagation and plantation of common fruit plants offer myriad economic opportunities for local communities. Through value-added activities such as fruit processing, marketing, and agro-tourism, the program catalyzes rural development and entrepreneurship, empowering individuals to harness the economic potential of fruit cultivation.

Holistic Approach to Sustainable Development: By prioritizing common fruit plants over timber-yielding species, the program embodies a holistic approach to sustainable development, balancing environmental conservation with socio-economic empowerment. Through collaborative efforts and community engagement, Phase V aims to create vibrant, resilient landscapes that not only nourish the body and soul but also foster prosperity and well-being for generations to come.

Phase VI (2024 Onward): Introducing Microbial Inoculants Dependent Farming Practice in Sundarban

Under the Sustainable Development with Plant Science Phase VI initiative, Raidighi College is embarking on a groundbreaking endeavor to introduce microbial inoculants dependent farming practices in the Sundarbans.

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
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OBSERVANCE OF IMPORTANT DAYS
